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Celia de Serra - The drawing



"They take a long time..."

"... I draw on HP Fabriano paper because the surface suits my drawing. There's the right amount of drag and softness. The feel of the pencil is very important. Plus a good quality paper means that the work should last indefinitely."

"...I use graphite pencils from B to 9B very interchangeably."

I use photographs - to start with to capture the effects of light which are fleeting. These becomes the spring board for a further exploration and interpretation/invention. The way light falls on the subject is a chance matter, sometimes the image presents itself as a fleeting moment. If I can exploit chance in nature, then I am lucky.

"...Although very representational, I am not a photorealist. I spend a lot of time roaming the countryside, getting a feel for places is very important, and searching for ideas that have something'or are compelling. I also spend a lot of time processing on the computer - as part of the creative process."

"...The drawings are loosely mapped out first then worked gradually from edge to edge, something process orientated, but also lyrically and fluidly - things change constantly and I re-work areas. Intense areas of detail are very important. The drawings are built up with many marks and layers - the surface of them is important in a painterly, animated way."
